In this newly created position, Shannon will have a variety of administrative duties related to museum operations. She will also lead the team of professionals working here, including John Moseley, curator of education and outreach who will continue to lead interpretation/storytelling through programs and public events, creation of lesson plans for schools, social media, and work to expand research and interpretation at the museum; Toni Foster, volunteer and visitor services coordinator, who has oversite of volunteers and internship training, and pre-K and kindergarten education; and soon to be filled, a fourth position!

Shannon is a native of southeastern NC, hailing from Columbus County (with family roots in the turpentine and farming industries dating back to the 18th century). She received her dual undergraduate degrees in history and studio art at Meredith College and went through graduate studies in public history at University of North Carolina Wilmington. She began her career with the North Carolina Department of Natural and Cultural Resources in January 2010 and spent over a decade with North Carolina Historic Sites at Brunswick Town/Fort Anderson State Historic Site. In 2015, she was promoted to assistant site manager and programs coordinator, handling a variety of school and public programming.

Shannon transferred to the North Carolina Maritime Museum at Southport in late December of 2022 where she served as the curator of programming and education. She was heavily involved in coordinating "In the Glorious Cause of Liberty: The 250th Anniversary of the Burning of Fort Johnston," the kick-off event commemorating the American Revolution in the Lower Cape Fear.

Shannon has a lifelong fascination with both history and science, and two of her major focuses in research and interpretation are medical and environmental history. In her free time, Shannon volunteers with Venus Flytrap Champions and the North American Sarracenia Conservancy where she assists with Venus flytrap rescue and relocation in areas with impending development.

Special Event with the Army Corps of Engineers on International Maritime Day

To celebrate International Maritime Day on September 25th, The Friends hosted a talk highlighting the critical work of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers in supporting the maritime economy along the Cape Fear River, as well as fishing and recreational boating in the area. They address "speed bumps in the channel," managing 1,500 miles of waterways. Our district field office ranks 5th nationally, with 8 branches, 5 field offices, and 58 members. Their contributions are vital to our region, state, and country.

Special thanks go to Project Manager, Bob Keistler and Chief of Public Affairs, Dave Connolly of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Wilmington District for sharing updates on navigation projects and future plans, which depend on available federal funding.

Dredging and sand renourishment efforts are uniquely coordinated through a partnership between the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the National Audubon Society. They collaborate with conservation agencies to repurpose dredged materials for wildlife, while minimizing impacts on the delicate marine ecosystem and as well as avoiding disturbances during the protected sea turtle nesting season. Another example of the Corps commitment to engineering solutions to meet the varied challenges of our beloved Cape Fear River.



What is/who are the U.S, Army Corps of Engineers?

The forming of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers began on June 14, 1775, more than a year before the signing of the Declaration of Independence. The Second Continental Congress established a regular army, naming George Washington the Commander-in-Chief. One of Washington's first acts was to ask Congress to authorize a Chief Engineer and two assistants for the new Continental Army. Its first project was building a well designed earthwork fortification to protect American Minutemen in the historic Battle of Bunker Hill.

During the early 19th century, Congress and presidents assigned military engineers to such duties as surveying, mapping, locating routes for superintending the construction of roads, canals, and coastal defensive works. Thus it was early in the history of the Corps that the dual role of military and civil works was established. This dual role – which the Corps maintains today – is totally unique to this organization.

In 1884, the Wilmington District was formed. The Wilmington District was initially charged with navigation channel improvements to rivers and harbors and fortifications (Fort Caswell). Currently, with more than 400 employees in North Carolina and Virginia, the Wilmington District team provides expertise across a wide range of disciplines -from engineering, architecture, design, construction, hydropower, recreation management, hydrology and environmental stewardship (like dredging channels and beach replenishment!). The Wilmington District supports and serves the federal interests of our nation by developing and facilitating innovative and effective solutions that meet engineering, environmental and emergency management needs for North Carolina, the U.S.Army, and the Nation.

Skippers Crew: Bewitching Broomsticks - October 4th from 10AM to 3PM

Craft a witch's broomstick using handprints during this special program on Oct. 4 from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the museum. This event is part of the museum's Skipper's Crew series.
